

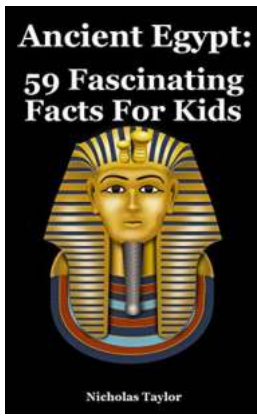
59 Fascinating Facts For Kids

14. The Eiffel Tower was originally built as a temporary structure.



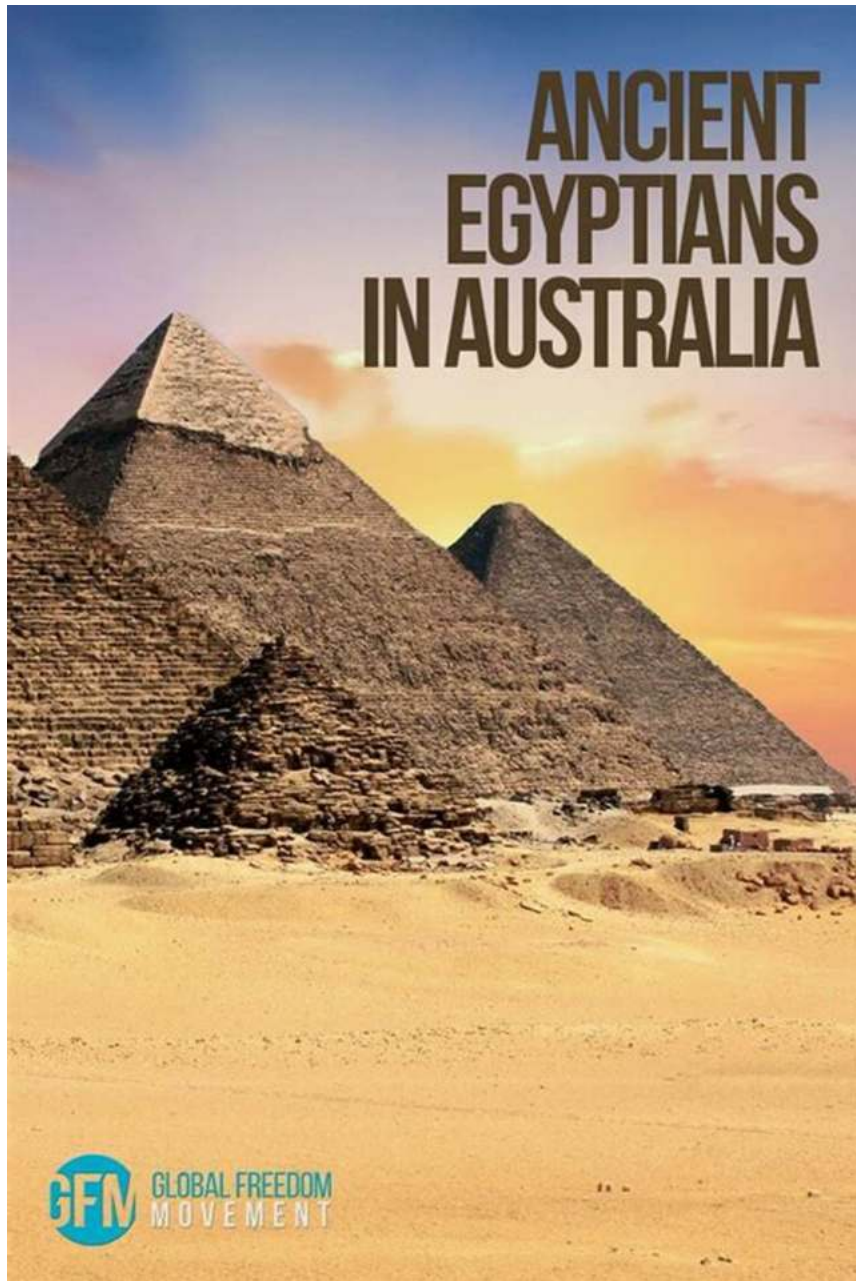

17. The hummingbird can fly backward.



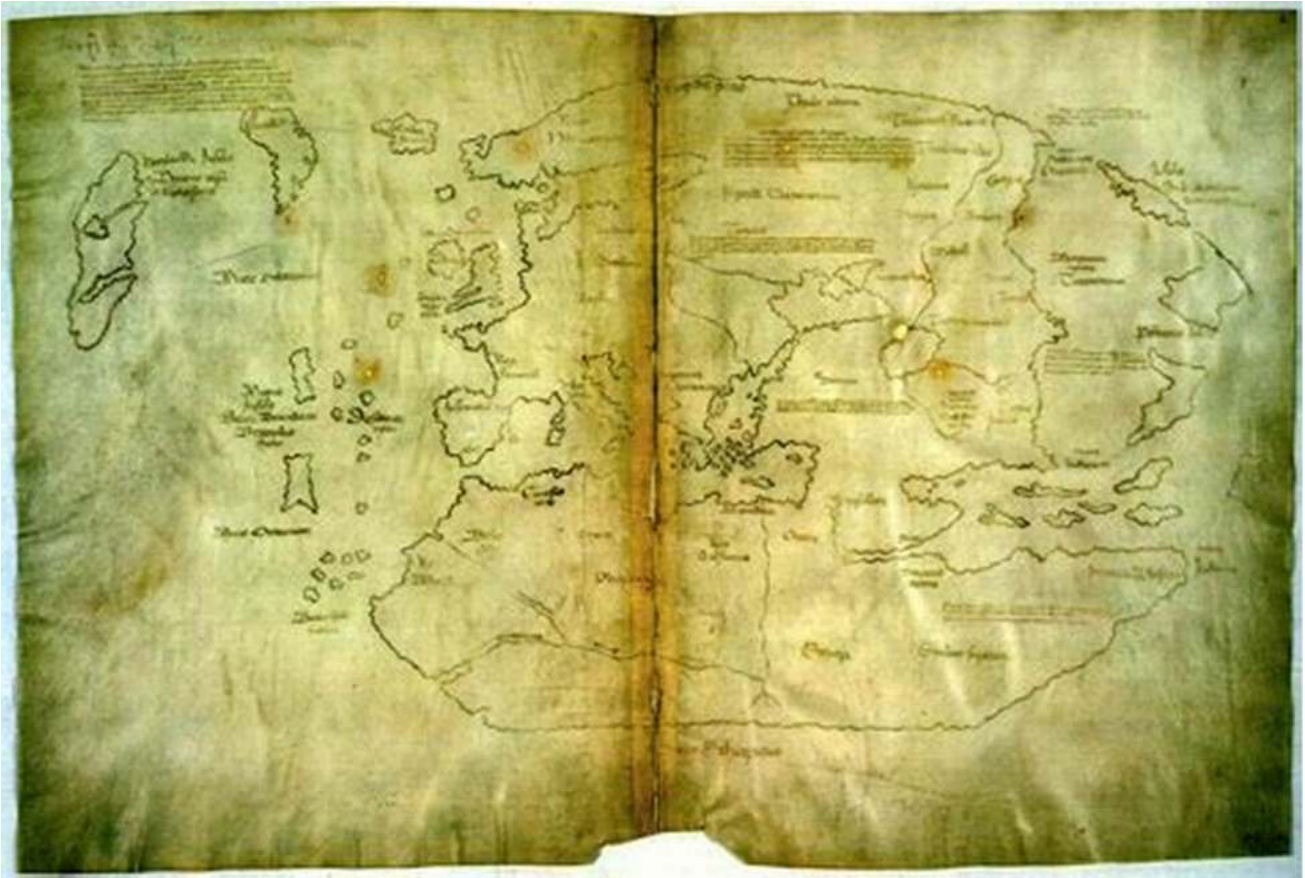

35. The Amazon River is the longest river in South America.



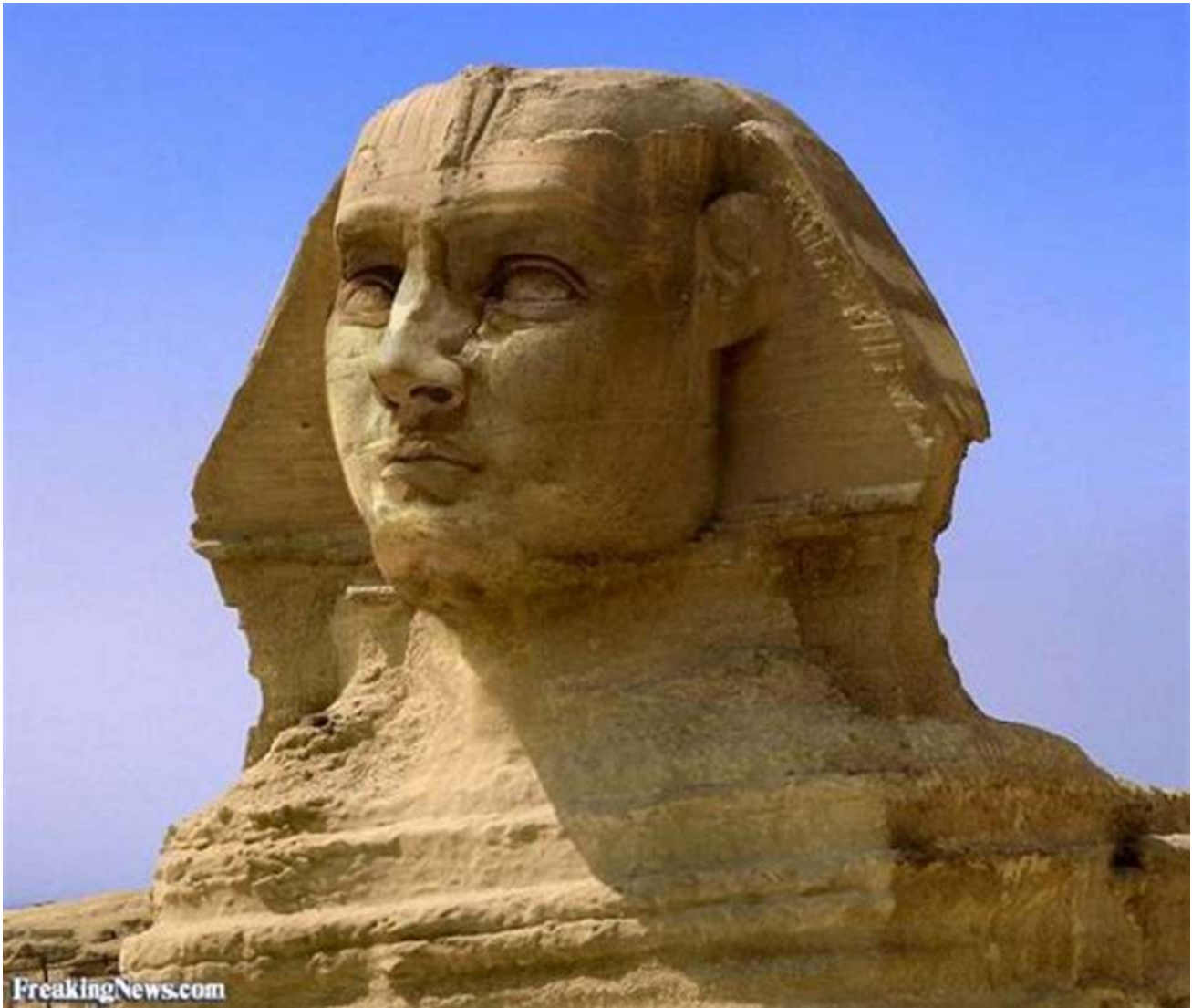

37. The Sphinx's nose is missing.



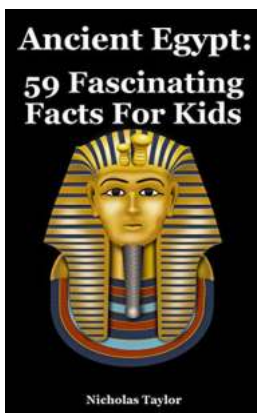
