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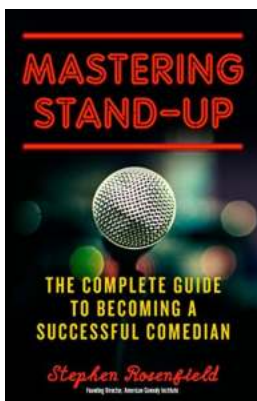

Seven weeks later she was in a first grade classroom in Flatbush, Brooklyn, nearly completely unprepared for what she was about to face.

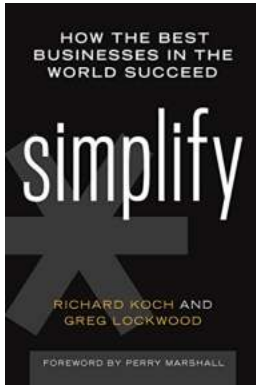
New York Times education reporter Abby Goodnough followed Donna Moffett through her first year as a teacher, writing a frontpage, award-winning series that galvanized discussion nationwide. Now she has expanded that series into a book that, through the riveting story of Moffett's experiences, explores the gulf between the rhetoric of education reform and the realities of the public school classroom. Ms. Moffett's First Year is neither a Hollywood- friendly tale of 'one person making a difference,' nor a reductive indictment of the public education system. It is rather a provocative portrait of the inadequacy of good intentions, of the challenges of educating poor and immigrant populations, and of a well-meaning but underprepared woman becoming a teacher the hard way.

While the story takes place in New York, Ms. Moffett's first year is a metaphor for the experiences of teachers everywhere in America, one that illuminates the philosophical, economic, political, and ideological dilemmas that have come more and more to determine their experience -- and their students' experiences -- in the classroom.



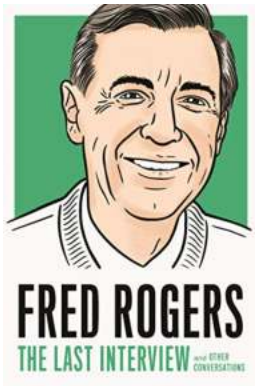
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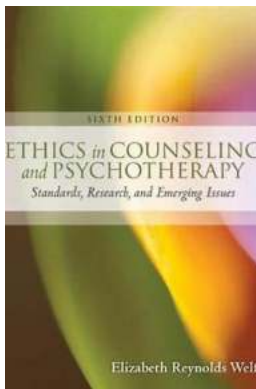
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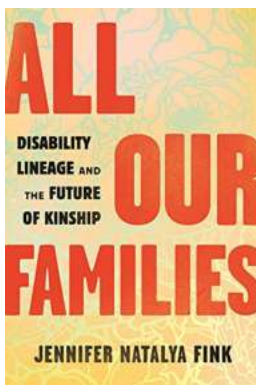

It is interesting that two studies of the history of Irish traditional music-making in County Clare are published within a year of each other. Of these two books both focus on the appropriation of 'pastoral' or 'past' traditions by churches (then or in the Irish republic), but other parts of Ireland are also part of the story.

Both authors are Irish males in their late 40s or 50s, but their accents are different in emphasis. Dr Peter, whose research focus is on the relationship between music and education, provides a broad and thoughtful history of the tradition in Ireland from the 18th century to the present. He is well-versed in the traditional practices and the social and cultural contexts in which they are most highly valued or even used today. In his book, Dr Peter, concentrating on the west Clare village of Dromin, where 'the old days' began 'before the 1900s' (16).

While Peter's approach is concerned with the overall context of Irish music, the authors write from different viewpoints. Of them, an anthropological approach and another, a more ethnomusicological one. Peter's approach is more of a 'pastoral' or 'past' tradition, and his research focuses on the relationship between music and education. 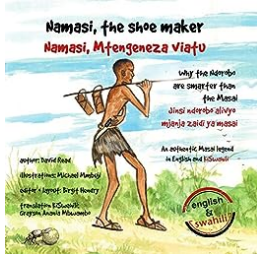
