

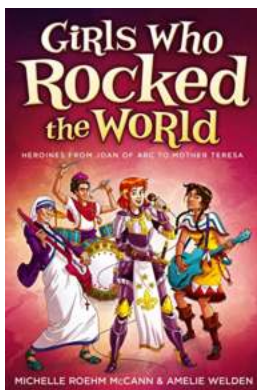

It’s never too soon to start making a difference, and these exhilarating examples of girl power in action make for ideal motivation.



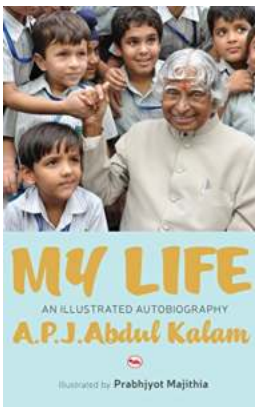
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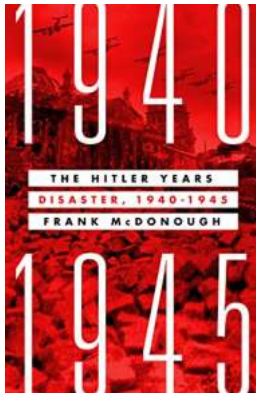
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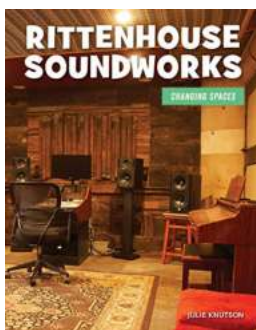
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
