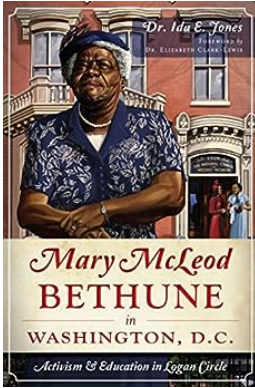

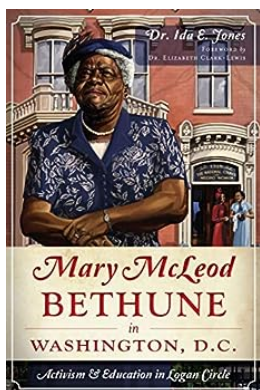

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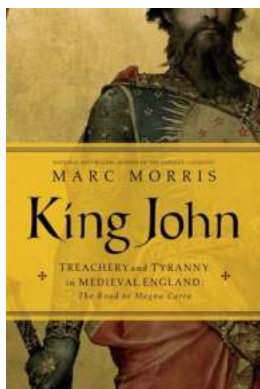
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The civil rights leader's life and work in the nation's capital, and her influence around the world, are celebrated in this biography.

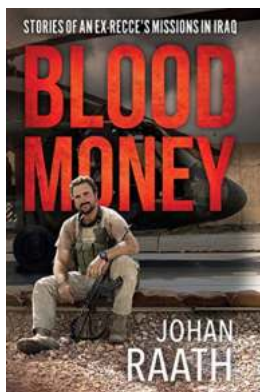
