Then, he supposedly picked up a handful of bloodsoaked earth, smeared it across his forehead, and vowed to kill the men responsible.

Award-winning journalist Anita Anand traced Singh's journey through Africa, the United States, and across Europe until, in March 1940, the young man finally arrived in front of O'Dwyer himself in a London hall ready to shoot him down. 




